

Welcome to Prince of Wales Park

An original 'People's Park' built between 1863 and 1865 with the voluntary labour and donations of local residents, they transformed this rugged piece of Gilstead moorland, planting some 15,000 trees to form this remarkable 18 acre woodland park.

Explore the paths, drives and stone steps which crisscross the park, from the formal terraced gardens they created below the **Brown Hill Quarry**, which rise up to an original remnant of heather and bilberry clad **Heath**.

Discover the poignantly empty **Poets Plinth**, a roofless **Round House**, an 'Abstainers' **Drinking Fountain**, Mr Wilson's spring water fed **Cascade** and find stone markers indicating the path of 19th century water conduits running beneath the park.

A 150 years later this park has been rejuvenated, once again by the labours of local people. Fortunately the trust established to manage the park prohibiting: drinking, gambling, Sunday games together with the discussion of politics and religion, has evolved to create a more inclusive space that we can all enjoy today.
